



In all five school communities, school councils are well established and ensure that parents in their community are represented. Each year, school councils participate in the school plan development process. The genuine involvement of school councils in the decision-making and consultation process is an ongoing process.



TRENDS AND CHALLENGES

Children's Services

In 2021-2022, the CSCE has reiterated its commitment to early childhood and after-school support services. The Board strongly believes in offering a range of services in French in a minority setting to counter assimilation, especially in times of pandemic.

Quality and Proficiency in French

The school board is aware of the importance of developing strategies and putting in place means to reach out to its many English-speaking or assimilated parents, welcoming them and accompanying them in their child's Francophone education. In fact, a large majority of students qualify for francization.

Specialized courses

In terms of programming, it is clear that the board is doing very well, given its resources, with the core range of courses. Schools with specialized facilities for some complementary courses at the high school level are doing well, but parents are anxious that arts and culture be lost in the process of the school board putting in place complementary programs.

Inclusion

The school board is proud of its record on inclusion but it was mentioned by both sides during the consultations that increased access to specialized French language services for inclusion and mental health must continue to be maintained.

Presence and connection with the community

However, partnerships with the community must be developed or maintained on an ongoing basis, as relationships between the school and the community are never permanently established.
